Impact of Interventions – Nursery

The interventions were analysed in December 2019 and March 2020. Unfortunately, due to the coronavirus pandemic, we were unable to collect the usual exit data in June 2020. Progress and attainment is tracked through a comprehensive assessment process. Data from each child's Key Person, meetings with parents, the evidence in individual Learning Journeys as well as information from regular observations are used to measure the impact of the interventions.

Communication and Language:

By March 2020 82% of EYPP children were at 'age related expectation' and 92% had made expected progress.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development:

By March 2020 91% of EYPP pupils were at 'age related expectation' and 82% had made expected progress.

Literacy:

By March 2020 73% of EYPP children were at 'age related expectation' and 92% had made expected progress.

Impact of Interventions – Pre-School

The 4 children who became eligible for EYPP from the Spring Term 2020 (the term after their third birthday) all made good progress with their individual targets.

Good progress was made in exploring emotions and developing confidence when interacting with peers. Relationships with parents were enhanced through the use of 'Home Learning Bags' and sharing resources.

Ways in which all pupils benefitted from EYPP

Other pupils benefitted from the Early Years Pupil Premium in the following ways:

- Children who needed additional support through the 'Wellcomm' programme to develop their speech, language and communication were given this and the Wellcomm training for staff updates their skills
- Children benefitted from support through the 'Nurture Group'.
- 1 child benefitted by having free lunch club.
- All children have benefitted from 'Tales Toolkit' as this has developed story telling skills, communication and language, children's confidence, and will lead on to early story writing
- The EYPP funding is boosted with additional school funds as we believe supporting children through the above mentioned strategies, and additional staff training, is an important part of entitlement to ensure good quality education opportunities and positive outcomes for all children.
